

Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000th consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.


On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6th Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21st century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in the *American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It remains a privilege to represent you in Congress, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on for the people of the Second Congressional District.

This year, our small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, states, and towns continued to face challenges related to the coronavirus pandemic. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health and our economy that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. While we are not yet out of the woods, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. Still, I know there are many Mainers who will continue to need assistance getting through this pandemic. I am committed to making sure our communities' most urgent needs are met to get our economy back on track.

One thing I am particularly proud of this year is that Democrats, Republicans, and the Biden Administration worked together to pass the bipartisan *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act*, which will make a once-in-a-generation investment in our nation's infrastructure and support Maine jobs. This bill will bring \$1.3 billion to Maine for highways and \$225 million for bridge replacement and repairs, as well as \$234 million to improve public transportation options. It will also allocate over \$100 million to help provide broadband access to the 42,000 Mainers currently without it and make 310,000 Mainers eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Benefit to help families pay for internet access. Crucially, it will also provide Maine with \$390 million to combat Maine's historically high rates of lead poisoning by replacing lead pipes and allowing Maine families access to clean drinking water.

Another one of my priorities in Congress is protecting Maine jobs. For one, shipbuilders at Bath Iron Works are a vital part of our economy, and the ships they build are critical to our national security. Throughout 2021, I led the Maine congressional delegation in pushing back against the Biden Administration's proposed decrease in DDG-51 shipbuilding, a proposal that would have had serious consequences for the shipbuilding workforce at BIW, one of the two shipyards that produces these destroyers, and American naval capabilities around the world. We fought successfully to include authorization for construction of three new DDG-51 destroyers in the final National Defense Authorization Act. I will continue to work hard with my colleagues on the House Armed Services Committee to ensure that we protect our national security and shipbuilding jobs in Maine.



Dear Friends and Residents of Northport,

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as your state senator. I am honored to represent Waldo County.

In this past year we took on another year of the COVID-19 pandemic. In doing so, we all faced personal and tragic losses, disruptions in our daily lives and an economy in recovery. It's been a hard year, and I'm honored to share that I continued to serve as Senate chair of the Innovation, Development, Economic Advancement and Business Committee. We are responsible for looking at a wide range of issues including supporting and uplifting Maine's workforce, strengthening local businesses and encouraging economic development. Our work is central in planning Maine's economic recovery. I also continued to serve on the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife Committee which focuses on enabling and promoting safe enjoyment of Maine's outdoors along with conservation duties to protect our wild resources.

In the last session, the Legislature focused on laws that would make a real difference in the lives of all Maine people. We passed laws to help improve access to affordable, high-quality medical care and lifesaving medications like insulin. We invested in senior living and nursing facilities and in our direct care workers, who have been so vital during the pandemic. In July, we passed a two-year bipartisan budget that, for the first time, meets the state's obligation to fund 55% of K-12 public education. We also restored municipal revenue sharing and increased property tax relief programs, all of which will help reduce property taxes for Maine people. I'm looking forward to continuing this in this legislative session.

At least for the start of the session, we will be doing much of our work virtually, and only convening in person when it's necessary. Our committee hearings and meetings will all be live-streamed and recorded and can be viewed online at www.legislature.maine.gov. Most importantly there are many ways you can have your voice heard at the legislature. You will be able to participate and provide testimony on bills via phone or videoconference, and by submitting written testimony at www.mainelegislature.org/testimony. The legislature works best when we hear from you. I am excited about legislation I submitted to support an uplift rural ambulance services to help ensure emergency medicine is available to Mainers regardless of where they live. I also introduced legislation to give more resources to the Child Welfare Ombudsman to protect Maine children.

It continues to be an honor to serve you in the Maine House of Representatives. I am proud to be your advocate in Augusta.

In 2021, despite the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, we were able to deliver big victories for the people of Maine. We passed a two-year state budget with overwhelming bipartisan support that will stabilize property taxes, keep free breakfast and lunch available to all students and protect our natural resources. Citizens of Waldo County,

The Members of the Waldo County Sheriff's Office are proud to serve the citizens of our great County. We want to thank the members of the public for their continued support. We are a full-service Sheriff's Office providing Law Enforcement, Corrections and Civil Paperwork Service to folks who live, work and visit Waldo County.

The Covid Pandemic continued to complicate the delivery of our services throughout the year. The Deputies, Corrections Officers and Civil Process Servers did a fantastic job working through the pandemic to ensure the safety of our citizens.

Our patrol division handled 9,280 calls for service in 2021. These calls included all types of incidents from murders, domestic violence, robberies, burglaries, thefts, child abuse, sexual abuse, drug overdoses, and much more. The drug abuse epidemic continued to ravage our citizens and cause much of the crime in our county. The patrol division also conducted 1,175 traffic stops throughout the county in an effort to increase traffic safety on our roads and highways.

Our Corrections Division finished its twelfth year in the operation of the Maine Coastal Regional Re-entry Center serving 52 residents in 2021. These are men who were nearing the end of their term of incarceration. Our many programs assist them with their integration back into society as productive and contributing citizens. During their stay at the re-entry center, residents provided 3,075 hours of community service throughout Waldo County. This translated to a savings in labor costs of \$37,361 to citizens and non-profit agencies. Residents also provided more than 173,000 pounds of fresh vegetables to local food pantries and those in need from the County's Garden Project overseen by Waldo County Commissioner William Shorey. The residents also paid \$3,552.36 dollars in room and board to the County.

The seventy-two-hour holding and booking facility processed 734 persons who were arrested in Waldo County by all the law enforcement agencies serving our County. If a person who has been arrested cannot make bail within 72 hours, he or she has to be transported to the Knox County Jail in Rockland by our Transport Division. Our average daily population of Waldo County prisoners held at the Knox County Jail was 25 men and women. This along with bringing prisoners to court and medical appointments, generated 274 transports with our transport division, traveling more than 29,748 miles in 2021.

Our Civil Service Division served 1,224 sets of legal paperwork all over the County in 2021.

It has been an honor for all of us to be of service to the citizens of Waldo County in 2021. We look forward to a safe and productive 2022.

Total Number of Complaints received in 2021 for Northport



Town Administrator Report

I am honored and humbled to have been chosen as Town Administrator, succeeding Barbara Ashley after her retirement last August. It has been a joy working with the experienced and talented staff at Town Office, and residents have welcomed me into this role with open arms. I have learned something new every day, and I look forward to what the future holds for the Town.

The Town's motto on the letterhead – "A Community of Neighbors, a Tradition of Caring" – says it all, and I thank the Town's residents for their resilience and dedication to the Town and to one another during the past few years of the pandemic.

The Town continues to face many of the same challenges as it has for the past several years, but I am pleased to report that we have made progress on several of them, and we are poised for further progress in the year to come.

The Broadband Internet Committee has worked tirelessly since February 2021 to develop a plan that will ensure that every home in Northport has access to high-speed internet. Global supply chain issues have affected the progress of the plan already in place, and the end cannot come soon enough for people with no internet access, but they are working on it, and we will get it done. The Committee asked and received the Town's blessing at a Special Town Meeting in February 2022 to commit all of the Town's funding from the American Rescue Plan Act to support broadband infrastructure, and, as of this writing, we are waiting to hear the results of a grant application that could provide funding to wire the rest of the Town. The Committee was also recognized earlier this year with a Small Town America Civic Volunteer Award, and we cannot thank them enough for their time and diligent efforts.

We launched a monthly email newsletter to help keep residents informed of news and events at Town Office and around Town. You can sign up for it on the Town's website, northportmaine.org.

We are also working on a completely new Town website, and I hope, by the time you are reading this, that that site will be live.

One piece of interesting trivia I learned this year came from the Boston Tea Party Museum, who alerted me to the presence of a Boston Tea Party participant buried here in Northport: Gersham Collier, in the Collier Cemetery on private property off Beech Hill Road. The Boston Tea Party Museum is planning to honor all known participants in the Tea Party on the 250th anniversary of that night, in December 2023. Stay tuned for more on that next year.

Little bits like that remind me that Northport has both a great past and a great future (as well as a great present). I look forward to working with all of you, and getting to meet and know more of you as we continue our work together.

Dear Residents of Northport,

The 2021-22 school year has been one of positive transitions. We moved from a hybrid model the previous year to a full-time schedule and it was wonderful for all involved. As we returned to fulltime, we continued to follow the CDC and Maine Department of Education recommendations. Overall, the year has been very successful, as we all know there is no better way to educate children than having them in school with their teachers and friends! Our staff and the community have been remarkable as we moved through these transitions. Our appreciation is abundant!

As we prepare the 2022-23 budget we are facing several unknowns in the areas of electricity, food costs, insurance costs, and heating costs. We are anticipating a decline in elementary student numbers, both in regular education and special education, and have adjusted the budget accordingly. However, we have a large group of students moving to the high school creating some significant tuition increases due to the programming needs of some of these students. We are requesting a 3.32% local assessment increase in the 2022-23-school budget. The positive news is that it still remains 4% less (\$137,416.77) than the 2014-15 assessment while we were a part of RSU 20.

As we end our seventh school year, and prepare for the next school year, we appreciate all of the support the Northport community has always shown to our school and your students.







Northport Volunteer Fire Department

2021 Annual report



I would like to thank the citizens of Northport for their continued support over the last year and for the men and women of this department who give up their time to help others in need.

The past year has been a very busy one here at the fire department. We welcomed 4 new members this past year which has brought our department up to 21 members currently. In November we made the decision to get rid of Engine 2 which was our forestry truck. It was new back in 1963 and the maintenance needs on it were becoming cost prohibitive. With the support of the municipal officers we were able to acquire a 2005 Dodge 4x4 pickup truck and as of this writing a generous donation has allowed us to purchase a new utility trailer to go with the truck which will carry all of our forestry equipment.

During the past year we responded to 61 calls for service broken down as follows:

Chimney Fires: 4

Public assist: 10

Wildland Fires: 3

Structure fire: 4

Downed power lines: 5

Smoke & Co alarms: 7

Trees down: 6

EMS assist: 3

Vehicle accidents: 19



Due to the shortage of firefighters statewide, we have been getting called more often to respond to fires outside of our neighboring towns. We expect this trend to continue.

I want to remind people to call 911 immediately if you think you may have a fire. With modern building construction and furnishings, every second truly matters and can make the difference in being able to save a home. We would much rather respond to a call and not be needed than to be called too late. I would also like to remind people to change the batteries in their smoke detectors every year and if your smoke detector is over 10 years old, it should be replaced. Working smoke detectors have proven to save lives.

As a reminder, a permit is required for any open burning in the State of Maine. Permits may be obtained online free of charge at www.wardensreport.com or through the State of Maine Forest Service at www.informe.org/burnpermit/public/index.html or at the town office. Generally permits are available after 5:00 pm on weekdays and after 9:00 am on weekends. As always, permit availability may be restricted due to weather conditions. Paper permits are also available at the Town office or from the fire chief.

Finally, I would like to invite anyone that has an interest in helping the community to consider joining your local fire department. Like most volunteer departments in the country, we are always in need of new members. I would encourage anyone interested in helping their Town to consider joining the fire department. If you have questions or would like more information, or want to come by and check us out, we meet the first Tuesday of every month at 7:00 pm. You can also contact me directly at firechief@northportmaine.org or give me a call at 322-2435.

During 2021, the First Responders were dispatched 119 times for a variety of assignments. The largest single reported reason for our call outs were falls. Falls being the largest portion of our calls is not unusual, but responding to these calls with COVID concerns has complicated our response. The balance and overall majority of our calls were a variety of reasons such as pains, medical issues such as diabetic complications, breathing problems, and the “catch all”, sick person.

We are very thankful for all of the efforts that everyone has gone to in an effort to stem the pandemic. Maine EMS has pushed very hard on local services to ensure that we use the correct protective equipment and receive vaccinations and boosters. We have all been very sensitive to protecting our patients and ourselves during this extraordinary situation.

Our membership is aging, much like our state’s population, and many of us have been part of the First Responders since its inception in 2002. We have some of the same infirmities as the patients that we are treating, which makes it easier walk in the patient’s shoes, but we are in need of volunteers to start passing the torch to.

For anyone intrepid enough to wish to join the First Responders we meet on the third Tuesday of each month at the Beech Hill Fire Station at 7pm. You will not find a better group of people whose interest is in helping the community.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

Heidi J Blood here, I look forward to serving the town of Northport as Animal Control Officer again this year and encourage all to contact me with any questions, complaints or concerns regarding Animal Control. I am also ACO for Lincolnville and Swanville, in addition to 3 Knox County towns. I live in Searsmont with an array of my own pets, including dogs, horses, chickens, cats and rabbits.

Just a few quick notes for you,

The Town of Northport currently has over 500 licensed dogs. And I'm happy to say that most were licensed in a timely manner this year. Your dog licensing fees support: State Humane Agents, Investigation of animal cruelty complaints and enforcement of animal welfare laws, Compliance with rabies vaccination of dogs and is vital in the return of lost dogs to their owners. Only \$1.00 per dog license stays within the town. The remainder is sent to Augusta to support the State of Maine Animal Welfare Program.

In 2021 I responded to more than 70 calls for assistance and traveled over 350 miles within the town. This is in addition to the countless calls, texts and emails from people seeking assistance or animal related resources.

The Town of Northport is contracted with PAWS Animal Shelter in Camden to take in our lost/stray animals that I pick up. So if your dog gets loose or your cat is found, and I cannot identify it, it gets delivered to the shelter for safe keeping until its owner can claim it. A fee must be paid to the shelter to claim your pet once it enters their care. If your dog is licensed and wearing its tags, I will make every effort to contact you and reunite you with your pet before delivering it to the shelter.

PAWS Animal Shelter will also take in owner relinquished animals, but Animal Control will not handle it. YOU must call PAWS at 236-8702 and make arrangements to get the animal to them for relinquishing. This helps the shelter by asking you questions about the animals likes/dislikes etc. Ensuring that they are placed into an appropriate new home.

Dog licenses expire each year on December 31, regardless of when it was first done.

You can renew your dog's license for the next year any time after October 15.

A state mandated late fee of \$25.00 is applied starting February 1st. This is non-negotiable as it is STATE law. You can renew your dog's license at the Town Office.

It is Maine Law that every dog AND CAT be currently vaccinated against Rabies. If you are unsure of your pets vaccination status, call and ask the town office or your Veterinarian.


Most vaccines are good for 3 years after a pets initial Rabies Vaccine which is only good for 1 year. Rabies is currently in every County of Maine, including Waldo and Knox County.

Animal Control does not generally handle wildlife complaints unless it is a wild animal that has come into contact with a domestic animal. Game Wardens or Wildlife rehabilitation Centers should be contacted for these calls.

I have live traps available for borrowing if you find yourself in need of trapping a nuisance animal. I also have several kennels and other equipment available.

I have asked the town administration to please review a suggested Animal Control Ordinance that has been enacted in several other towns that I work for. This ordinance has proven to be very effective in gaining voluntary compliance with many State Animal Welfare laws. In addition to voluntary compliance it has also been a very useful tool to issue fines for frequent violators of Maine Animal Law, again due to Covid-19 and the continued Pandemic, it has been nearly impossible to issue court summons for Civil Animal law violations, as the courts are concentrating on criminal cases. Which leaves me with little to no recourse for frequent violators. I urge you to read over the suggested Ordinance and contact me with any questions or concerns.

Again, please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions, complaints or concerns regarding animals in Northport or Maine animal Law

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Northport in said County and State, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to appear at the Northport Town Hall on Saturday, June 05, 2021 at 8:00 a.m., there and then to act upon Articles 1 and 2

AND

To notify and warn said voters to meet at the Edna Drinkwater School on Monday, June 07, 2021 at 6:30 p.m. there and then to act upon Articles 3 through 51 inclusive.

Article 1. To Choose a Moderator to preside at said Town Meeting.

On Saturday June 05, 2021 Town Clerk Amy Eldridge opened the meeting by greeting those present at Town Hall for the purpose of action on Articles 1 and 2. Motion was made by Jeff Littlefield and second by Amy Eldridge to nominate Robin Coombs as Moderator of the election portion of the Town Meeting. Three votes were cast in favor of Coombs. Coombs was sworn in as Moderator by Town Clerk Amy Eldridge.

Article 2. To elect by secret ballot:

One (1) Selectman, Assessor and Overseer of the Poor for a three (3) year term.

Breanna Pinkham Bebb 71 votes, No write in votes, blank votes 2

One (1) School Committee Member for a three (3) year term.

Sandy (Ann) Wallace 71 votes, No write in votes, blank votes 2

One (1) Road Commissioner for a two (2) year term.

Amon Morse III 70 votes, Ralph Flanders 1 vote, blank votes 2

Eldridge closed the Election portion of the Annual Town Meeting at 8:47pm on June 05, 2021 and would reconvene on Monday June 7, 2021 at 6:30 pm at the Edna Drinkwater School.

Eldridge opened the Annual Town Meeting at 6:30 p.m. by greeting the 47 residents present at the Edna Drinkwater School for the purpose of acting on Articles 3 through 51. Eldridge introduced herself and thanked everyone for attending. Eldridge congratulated Breanna Pinkham Bebb for Selectmen, Sandy (Ann) Wallace for School Committee and Amon Morse III for Road Commissioner. All were re-elected to their current positions as a result of the Town Election on June 5, 2021 at the Town Office. Eldridge proceeded to call for nominations for Moderator to preside over Town Meeting.

Eldridge read Article 1 and asked for any nominations. Nomination was made by Karl Beiser, seconded by Robin Coombs, to have Lee Woodward, Jr serve as Moderator over The Annual Town Meeting. Three ballots were cast in favor of Woodward. Woodward recited the oath to Eldridge, swearing him in as Moderator over Town Meeting. Woodward proceeded to introduce our State Senate District 11 Representative Glenn “Chip” Curry. He provided the residents with an update on what the Legislature has been working on. He spoke about funding school lunches and full funding of municipal revenue sharing. Woodward then introduced Paul Robie whom reported on behalf of Janice Dodge. He apologized for her not being able to attend the meeting. He reported on the bills that the House of Representatives have been working on, and expressed to everyone to please keep in touch with Janice Dodge about any concerns. Woodward then introduced Town Administrator Barbara Ashley. Ashley gave a special thank you to Robin Coombs, Deputy Town Clerk for her 25 years of service to the Town of Northport. She explained how Robin is always there and does so much for the Town. Ashley presented Robin with a tear drop crystal to show thanks and appreciation from the Town.

Woodward introduced Town Finance Director, Vicki Eugley, whom reported that Town Administrator Barbara Ashley would be retiring after 17 years of service to the Town of Northport. Ashley was recognized for her leadership, dedication, open door policy and many years of service. Eugley wished her well and presented Ashley with flowers and a token of the Towns appreciation.

Woodward proceeded to explain the process of the Town Meeting and both the Select Board and the School Board have determined multiple articles that could be combined. Combining the articles in bundles will help decrease the time of the gathering.

Article 3. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to raise, and appropriate to pay the Selectmen/Assessors/Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year. (Current salary–Selectmen \$3,500.00–Selectman Chair \$4,000.00) *Selectmen recommend no change. Motion was made and second to approve the Board recommended amount. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

Article 4. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to pay the Road Commissioner, Road Workers, Trucks and Equipment for the ensuing year. (Selectmen recommend State Rates plus 10% for routine road maintenance. Major road reconstruction to follow the competitive bid process.) *Motion was made and second to approve the Board recommended amount. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

Article 5. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to pay members of the Planning Board. (Current pay \$27.50 for each member per meeting or workshop attended; and \$32.50 for the Chairman for each meeting or workshop attended.) *Selectmen recommend no change. Motion was made and second to approve the Board recommended amount. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and expend \$5,000.00 for the Northport Scholarship Fund for second semester Northport college freshmen. *Motion was made and second to approve the Article as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and expend funds for the Northport Village Corporation an amount of \$10,000.00. *Motion was made and second to approve the Article as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Beverly Crofoot asked each Selectman to explain their reasoning as to why they decreased the amount requested by Northport Village Corporation of \$25,000.00 to \$10,000.00. Michelle Patten, Chairman stood and explained there are things that are in the Towns control and not in our control. After reviewing the Budget for the Town of Northport, Patten wanted funds to be designated to NVC, but determines there were many areas in Town where funds were needed and the full requested amount could not be granted.*

Jeanine Tucker stood and stated she opted to have zero amount budgeted to NVC due to the overwhelming need for Broadband for the Town and Northport Village Corporation. She expressed that NVC should be able to fully fund their budget without the \$25,000.00 from the Town.

Breanna Pinkham Bebb stood and reported when she first ran for the Selectman position, feedback she received from residents was that they wanted taxes lowered and better internet. With Broadband being needed throughout the Town of Northport, she decided to allocate \$15,000.00 of the \$25,000.00 toward Broadband which left \$10,000.00 that could be provided to NVC to assist toward the NVC budget.

Karl Beiser asked if anyone in the Town could provide more history on the appropriation request from Northport Village Corporation. Jane Novotny a resident, and an Overseer for Northport Village Corporation, provided her knowledge of the history. Independent Auditors' Report

**To the Selectboard

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Northport, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We did not audit the financial statements of the Northport School Department's general fund and other governmental funds (special revenue funds), which represent 44%, 28%, and 62%, respectively, of the assets, fund balances/net position, and revenues of the Town of Northport, Maine. Those statements were audited by other auditors whose report has been furnished to us, and in our opinion, insofar as it relates to the amounts included for the general fund and other governmental funds, is based solely on the report of the other auditors. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinions

In our opinion, based on our audit and the report of other auditors, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Northport, Maine, as of June 30, 2021, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis, budgetary comparison information, the Schedule of the Town's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability, the Schedule of the Town's Pension Contributions, the Schedule of the Town's Proportionate Share of the MEPERS Plan Net OPEB Liability, the Schedule of Changes in the Town's Total MMEHT Plan OPEB Liability and Related Ratios, the Schedule of Changes in the Town's Total MEABT Plan OPEB Liability and Related Ratios, and the Notes to the Schedules, as noted in the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Northport, Maine's basic financial statements. The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Northport in said County and State, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to appear at the Northport Town Hall on Saturday, June 4, 2022 at 8:00 a.m., there and then to act upon Articles 1 and 2

AND

To notify and warn said voters to meet at the Edna Drinkwater School on Monday, June 6, 2022, at 6:30 p.m. there and then to act upon Articles 3 through 50 inclusive.

Article 1. To Choose a Moderator to preside at said Town Meeting.

Article 2. To elect by secret ballot:

One (1) Municipal Officer, Assessor, and Overseer for a three (3) year term.

One (1) School Committee Member for a three (3) year term.

Article 3. Shall a revised ordinance entitled “Town of Northport Animal Control Ordinance” be enacted and repeal and replace any Municipal Animal Control Ordinance previously enacted? *An attested copy of the full text of this ordinance has been posted together with this warrant, and copies are available from the office of the Town Clerk and will be available at the Town Meeting.*

Article 4. Shall amendments to the Town of Northport Building Permit Ordinance be enacted? *An attested copy of the amendments to this ordinance has been posted together with this warrant, and copies are available from the office of the Town Clerk and will be available at the Town Meeting.*

Article 5. Shall amendments to the Town of Northport Shoreland Zoning Ordinance be enacted? *An attested copy of the amendments to this ordinance has been posted together with this warrant, and copies are available from the office of the Town Clerk and will be available at the Town Meeting.*

Article 6. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Municipal Officers/Assessors/Overseers for the ensuing year. (Current salary—Municipal Officer \$3,500.00— Chair of the Select Board \$4,000.00) *Select Board recommends no change.*

Article 7. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to pay the Road Commissioner, Road Workers, Trucks and Equipment for the ensuing year. (Select Board recommends State Rates plus 10% for routine road maintenance. Major road reconstruction to follow the competitive bid process.)

Article 8. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to pay members of the Planning Board. (Current pay \$27.50 for each member per meeting or workshop attended; and \$32.50 for the Chairman for each meeting or workshop attended.) *Select Board recommends \$30.00 for each member per meeting or workshop attended; and \$35.00 for the Chairman for each meeting or workshop attended.*
