

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My AUTO for Vets Act also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the Respect for Marriage Act, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the Electoral Count Reform Act, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21st century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.

Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan CHIPS Act will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

In August, I voted for the *Inflation Reduction Act* because it represented a dramatic turnaround from misguided efforts to pass sweeping, ill-designed legislation that tried to accomplish too many things through budget gimmicks, setting up problematic fiscal cliffs in numerous programs and refusing to make the difficult decisions to allow for a fiscally responsible bill.

The Inflation Reduction Act, which was signed into law by the president, was fiscally responsible and targeted four key priorities: reducing our national debt and putting our country back on a more sustainable path, lowering the cost of prescription drugs, and making health care more affordable, investing in an all-of-the-above energy strategy to significantly increase oil, gas, and renewable energy production to lower energy costs for Americans, and cracking down on the tax avoidance of billion-dollar multinational corporations. This bill was the first major legislation in the last decade to use the reconciliation process to create a fiscally responsible budget to reduce deficits. The Congressional Budget Office estimated it would reduce deficits by approximately \$300 billion.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I also helped pass the Fiscal Year 2023 National Defense Authorization Act, which among other things, included key wins for Bath shipbuilders, UMaine, and servicemembers and their families. For shipbuilders, the bill secured authorization for a third DDG-51 destroyer; established a new contract for up to 15 DDG-51 destroyers over the next five years, many of which will be built at Bath Iron Works; and included funding for shipyard infrastructure. The bill also authorized over \$25 million for defense research programs, including UMaine's large-scale manufacturing program. Finally, the bill authorized a 4.6% pay increase to help servicemembers and their families deal with rising costs due to inflation.

Additionally, at the end of 2022, Congress passed a spending bill to fund the government through September of 2023. The bill funds nearly \$27 million in funding for community projects across the Second Congressional District, a lifeline for our lobster industry that freezes any regulatory action for at least six years, and secures millions in additional funding for the Low Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help Mainers heat their homes.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. Citizens of Waldo County,

The Members of the Waldo County Sheriff's Office are proud to serve the citizens of our great County. We want to thank the members of the public for their continued support. We are a full-service Sheriff's Office providing Law Enforcement, Corrections and Civil Paperwork Service to those who live, work, and visit Waldo County.

Our patrol division handled 8,944 calls for service in 2022. These calls included all types of incidents from murders, domestic violence, robberies, burglaries, thefts, child abuse, sexual abuse, drug overdoses, and much more. The patrol division also conducted 1,659 traffic stops throughout the county in an effort to increase traffic safety on our roads and highways.

Our corrections division finished its thirteenth year in the operation of our 72-hour intake and the Maine Coastal Regional Re-entry Center. The men who participated in the programming of the re-entry center were nearing the end of their term of incarceration. Our many programs assist them with their integration back into society as productive and contributing citizens. During their stay at the re-entry center, residents provided 2,958 hours of community service throughout Waldo County. This translated to a savings in labor costs of \$40,820 to citizens and non-profit agencies. Residents also provided more than 40,000 pounds of fresh vegetables to local food pantries and those in need from the County's Garden Project overseen by Waldo County Commissioner William Shorey. The residents also paid \$21,312.00 dollars in room and board to the County.

The seventy-two-hour holding and booking facility processed 757 persons who were arrested in Waldo County by all the law enforcement agencies serving our County. If a person who has been arrested cannot make bail within 72 hours, he or she has to be transported to the Knox County Jail in Rockland by our Transport Division. Our average daily population of Waldo County prisoners held at the Knox County Jail was 23 men and women. This along with bringing prisoners to court and medical appointments, generated 246 transports with our transport division, traveling more than 35,392 miles in 2022.

Our Civil Service Division served 1,388 sets of legal paperwork all over the County in 2022.

It has been an honor for all of us to be of service to the citizens of Waldo County in 2022. In my first year as your newly elected Sheriff, it is my intention to focus the resources of the Sheriff's Office on enhancing traffic safety and addressing substance abuse. These issues and the associated criminal behavior associated with them impact the quality of life of everyone in Waldo County. We look forward to providing the citizens of Waldo County with Professional law enforcement services based on our core values of Integrity, Teamwork and Compassion. We wish everyone a safe and productive 2023.

Town Administrator Report

This has been a year of transitions and changes. Shelly Patten, Chair of the Select Board, is stepping down this year after two terms. I had the honor and privilege for the last two years of seeing her run efficient and effective Select Board meetings. We all thank her for her service, and hope that we can rope her into some committee work once she has had some time to recover.

We rooted for Tim Patten when he had to take a few months off from his duties at the Transfer Station, and wish him all the best for a full recovery. We are deeply grateful to Richie Taylor for sticking it through the winter and running the station in Tim's absence. We had to make some adjustments at the Transfer Station, including reduced hours, and I thank everyone for their patience and understanding.

Speaking of the Transfer Station, we added a food waste collection area, run by Scrap Dogs Community Compost, for residents to turn their kitchen scraps into compost. In its third year at the Transfer Station, the Waldo County Woodshed distributed more than 11 cords of firewood to Northport families this winter, valued at over \$3600.

The Town's zero-sort recycling program is becoming increasingly expensive. We are exploring options for reducing the cost and would welcome your input on the process. Please let me know if you would like to help.

In 2018 and 2019, the Town worked with Amanda Austin at 2a architects on plans for a new town office, connected to the fire station, with ample community space. Those plans were shelved because of covid, but the needs – for a modern, accessible, and safe town office, increased fire department training area, and indoor community space – remain. We have begun working with Amanda again, and we will be dedicating a lot of time and resources to this project in the coming years. We want to make sure that we have a new facility that everyone can be proud of. Please let me know if you have any questions about the project or its process. We will be holding informational sessions about the project as it moves along.

GWI, a Maine-based internet service provider, won a second grant to finish wiring the entire Town with fiber-optic internet, and the first homes and businesses were connected this spring. GWI's work will continue into 2024, and it is very welcome. For those with no internet access at all, or just terribly slow internet, the change will be profound.

We now publish a monthly email newsletter to help keep residents informed of news and events at Town Office and around Town. You can sign up for it on the Town's website, northportmaine.org.

We were very happy to have had Jeffrey Wilt as the Northport Village Corporation representative to the Select Board for the past two(ish) years, with NVC President Janae Novotny filling in for him on occasion. Between the two of them, they attended nearly every Select Board meeting, and we had many productive discussions about the shared future of the Town and NVC.

We celebrated several milestones this year – Tim Patten, with 20 years at the Transfer Station, Toupie Rooney with 15 years in Code Enforcement, and Vicki Eugley, with 30 years as Finance Director. Their tireless dedication to the Town helps make it run as smoothly as it does. Please thank them for their service to the community when you see them.

I have a long way to go to catch up to my long-serving colleagues, but I enjoy every day I get to work with them.

Dear Residents of Northport,

The 2022-2023 school year has been one of returning to the Edna Drinkwater School we all know and love! We have opened our doors again to all of the activities we once held prior to Covid. The year has been very successful. Our amazing PTG was able to sponsor activities such as the exciting Halloween celebration, the holiday shopping day for our students to buy for their families, and so many more! The After School program has returned. Our staff and the community have been incredibly supportive as we moved through this transition.

One focus at the elementary level has been on school safety. We have added security cameras and have improved our radio communication system (school based and busses) with both the Waldo County Sheriffs' Department and Waldo County Emergency Management. We have replaced several door and locks and have emergency supplies in each classroom. The staff has been trained in A.L.I.C.E. (alert/lockdown/inform/counter/evacuate) a nationally recognized active shooter training. Although we all hope we never will have to put any of this in practice, it is important that we remain as prepared as possible.


At the high school level, we have sixty-four students in seven Department of Education approved high schools. The largest of this population is going to Belfast High School. Our tuition numbers have remained constant for the past few years.

The School Board and administration has been working diligently to develop a school budget that meets the needs of our students and is fiscally responsible to the tax payers. We have worked to keep increases as low as possible. We have reduced a position at the Drinkwater School and will continue to be using grant funds to cover the cost of a teaching position. We have also applied available carryover monies and our remaining Maine PERS reserve funds to reduce the budget as much as possible. The 2023-2024 budget will be an increase of 3.58%. The positive news is that it still remains \$81,286.47 less than the 2014-15 assessment while we were a part of RSU 20.

As we end our eighth school year, and look forward to the next, we greatly appreciate all of the support the Northport community has always shown to our schools.



Challenges we had while building the 23-24 budget:

- Tuition Increases through State of Maine are expected to come in at 7%.
 (Normally we see an average of 2-2 ½%.)
- We also know of 4 -5 potential secondary students moving into Northport.
- We settled teacher negotiations with a first year increase of 5.75 %
- Health Insurance increases are set for 23-24 at 3%
- Increase in Employer rate of MainePERS contributions from 3.84 % to 4.47
- State Subsidy was \$ 7,970.72 less than 22-23. (It has declined approx. \$7 K in each of the prior 3 years.)

The Steps we took to help mitigate the uncontrollable increases:

- We used a reserve of an extra \$ 48 K from the MainePERS reserve from Withdrawal funds
- We used an extra \$ 50 K of our carryover
- We cut \$ 20K in supplies, professional development, curriculum, and other items in the elementary budgets
- We eliminated one position
- We added one position to the budget from Title IA to preserve these funds for the 24-25 fiscal year and the
- lack of any remaining ARP funding to avoid a cliff to the local budget.

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



I would like to thank the citizens of Northport for their continued support over the last year and for the men and women of this department who give up their time to help others in need.

The past year has been a very busy one here at the fire department. We welcomed 2 new members this past year which has brought our department up to 24 members currently. Even with our new members, we are still in search of more people to join the department. During weekdays we are extremely short handed and are in need of people who have the ability to respond during the daytime.

Lastly I would like to remind everyone that a permit is required for any open burning in the State of Maine. The fines and suppression costs for illegal burning can add up quickly. Burn permits may be obtained online at www.wardensreport.com or on the Maine Forest Service Website. Open burning is generally allowed after 5:00pm during the week and after 9:00am on weekends depending on weather conditions at the time.

For anyone intrepid enough to wish to join the First Responders we meet on the third Tuesday of each month at the Beech Hill Fire Station at 7pm. You will not find a better group of people whose interest is in helping the community.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

Heidi J Blood here, I look forward to serving the Town of Northport as Animal Control Officer again this year and encourage all to contact me with any questions, complaints or concerns regarding Animal Control. I am also ACO for Lincolnville and Swanville, in addition to 3 Knox County towns. I live in Searsmont with an array of my own pets, including dogs, horses, chickens, cats, ferrets and rabbits. I have been a Certified Animal Control Officer for more than 20 years, and am well versed in Maine animal law, so please do not hesitate to call email or message with questions or concerns.

Just a few quick notes for you,

The Town of Northport currently has over 400 licensed dogs. And I'm happy to say that most were licensed in a timely manner again this year. Your dog licensing fees support: State Humane Agents, Investigation of animal cruelty complaints and enforcement of animal welfare laws, Compliance with rabies vaccination of dogs and is vital in the return of lost dogs to their owners. Only \$1.00 per dog license stays within the town to assist with local costs. License tags are vital in getting your dog returned home quickly, if he or she wanders off.

In 2022 I responded to more than 110 calls for assistance and traveled over 300 miles within the town. This is in addition to the countless calls, texts and emails from people seeking answers to animal law or animal related resources.

The Town of Northport is contracted with PAWS Animal Adoption Center in Camden to take in lost/stray animals that I pick up. So if your dog gets loose or your cat is found, and I cannot identify it, it gets delivered to the shelter for safe keeping until its owner can claim it. I try my best to make social media posts and call around to neighbors when I pick up a pet. If I cannot locate an owner, a fee must be paid to the shelter to claim your pet once it enters their care. If your dog is licensed and wearing its tags, I will make every effort to contact you and reunite you with your pet before delivering it to the shelter. Please make sure the town office has a current and correct phone number for you.

PAWS Animal Adoption Center will also take in owner relinquished animals, but Animal Control will not handle it. YOU must call them and make arrangements to get the animal to them for relinquishing. This helps the shelter by asking you questions about the animals likes/dislikes etc. Ensuring that they are placed into an appropriate new home.

Dog licenses expire each year on December 31, regardless of when it was first done. You can renew your dog's license for the next year anytime after October 15. A state mandated Late fee of \$25.00 is applied starting February 1st. This is non negotiable as it is STATE law. You can renew your dog's license in person at the Town Office or by phone.

It is Maine Law that every dog AND CAT be currently vaccinated against Rabies. Yes, even Indoor cats are required to be vaccinated against rabies, because rabies vector animals can and do enter homes. If you are unsure of your pets vaccination status, call and ask the town office or your Veterinarian. Most vaccines are good for 3 years after a pets initial Rabies Vaccine which is only good for 1 year. The Rabies disease is currently in every County of Maine, including Waldo and Knox County.

PLEASE! Spay and neuter your cats!!!! Feral cat colonies are a problem in every town in Maine. There are numerous programs available to help with the cost of spay/neuter and vaccination. Please call me, if you need help with spaying and neutering feral colonies. PS By Maine Statute, if you feed a stray cat for 10 or more days, you are assuming financial responsibility for the cat. If you see an unfamiliar cat in your neighborhood, check with your neighbors and leam who has what for animals. DO NOT FEED THEM!!! Unless you are willing to take responsibility for the cat. Many owned cats will take advantage of a kind heart.......

Animal Control does not generally handle wildlife complaints unless it is a wild animal that has come into contact with a domestic animal and rabies is a concern. Game Wardens or Wildlife rehabilitation Centers should be contacted for wildlife calls.

I have live traps available for borrowing if your find yourself in need of trapping a nuisance animal. I also have several kennels and other equipment available.

Again, please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions, complaints or concerns regarding animals in Northport or Maine animal laws.






Northport Ridge Riders



OFFICIAL WARRANT FOR THE TOWN OF NORTHPORT ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To be held on June 4, 2022, and June 6, 2022

To: Amy Eldridge, Town Clerk of the Town of Northport in the County of Waldo, State of Maine.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and wam the inhabitants of the Town of Northport in said County and State, qualified by law to vote in Town a ffairs to appear at the Northport Town Hall on Saturday, June 4, 2022 at 8:00 a.m., there and then to act upon Articles 1 and 2 AND

To notify and warn said voters to meet at the Edna Drinkwater School on Monday, June 6, 2022, at 6:30 p.m. there and then to actupon Articles 3 through 50 inclusive.

Article 1. To Choose a Moderator to preside at said Town Meeting.

On Saturday June 04, 2022 Town Clerk Amy Eldridge opened the meeting by greeting those present at Town Hall for the purpose of action on Articles 1 and 2. Motion was made by Amy Eldridge and second by Paul Sheridan to nominate Robin Coombs as Moderator of the election portion of the Town Meeting. Coombs was sworn in as Moderator by Town Clerk Amy Eldridge.

Article 2. To elect by secret ballot:

One (1) Municipal Officer, Assessor, and Overseer for a three (3) year term.

Jeanine Tucker received 50 votes, no write in votes, blank votes 2

One (1) School Committee Member for a three (3) year term.

Debora Riley received 50 votes, no write in votes, blank votes 2

Eldridge closed the Election portion of the Annual Town Meeting at 8:15 pm on June 04, 2022 and would reconvene on Monday June 6, 2022 at 6:30 pm at the Edna Drinkwater School.

Eldridge opened the Annual Town Meeting at 6:30 p.m. by greeting the 53 residents present at the Edna Drinkwater School for the purpose of acting on Articles 3 through 50. Eldridge introduced herself, thanked all for coming, and then asked Herman Littlefield to lead the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. Upon the conclusion of the Pledge, Eldridge read aloud the results of the Election on June 4, 2022 at the Town Office.

Eldridge reported that there were 52 votes cast at the polls. Jeanine Tucker was reelected as Municipal Officer with 50 votes; and 2 blank votes. Debora Riley was reelected as the Northport School Committee Member with 50 votes; and 2 blank votes. Eldridge read Article 1 and called for any nominations for Moderator to preside over Town Meeting. Nomination was made by Howard Sawyer, seconded by Paul Sheridan, to have Lee Woodward, Jr serve as Moderator over The Annual Town Meeting. Three ballots were cast in favor of Woodward. Eldridge recited the oath to Woodward, swearing him in as Moderator over Town Meeting. Woodward proceeded to introduce Owen Smith, the Democratic candidate for District 1 County Commissioner; Jason Trundy, Democratic candidate for Waldo County Sheriff; Stephen Hemenway, the Republican candidate for House District 39; Rep. Jan Dodge, the Democratic candidate for House District 39, and Glenn "Chip" Curry, Democratic candidate for State Senate for Waldo County.

Each year the Selectmen are requested to nominate someone for the Spirit of America Award, which encourages and recognizes those who volunteer. The individual(s) must demonstrate a strong sense of community and volunteerism. This year Shelly Patten, Chair of the Northport Select Board, read a resolution commending the Town's Broadband Internet Committee for its community service. She presented the Spirit of American Award for 2022 to the Northport Broadband Internet Committee members Ann Frenning Kossuth, Avery Kreamer, Karl Beiser, Julian Sheffield, Bill Frysinger, Brady Brim-DeForest, Katie Foster and Jamie Ritter for their exemplary citizenship and outstanding achievement.

Woodward proceeded to explain the process of the Town Meeting and both The Select Board and the School Board have determined multiple articles that could be combined. Combining the articles will decrease the time of the gathering.

Article 3. Shall a revised ordinance entitled "Town of Northport Animal Control Ordinance" be enacted and repeal and replace any Municipal Animal Control Ordinance previously enacted? An attested copy of the full text of this ordinance has been posted together with this warrant, and copies are available from the office of the Town Clerk and will be available at the Town Meeting. Motion was made and seconded to approve the article as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Karen Young asked what animals the ordinance covered. Herman Littlefield, Deputy Animal Control Officer, reported that any domestic animal would fall under this ordinance. Woodward called for any more questions or comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.

Article 4. Shall amendments to the Town of Northport Building Permit Ordinance be enacted? An attested copy of the amendments to this ordinance has been posted together with this warrant, and copies are available from the office of the Town Clerk and will be available at the Town Meeting. Motion was made and seconded to approve the article as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor — none opposed. Article passed.

Article 5. Shall amendments to the Town of Northport Shoreland Zoning Ordinance be enacted? An attested copy of the amendments to this ordinance has been posted together with this warrant, and copies are available from the office of the Town Clerk and will be available at the Town Meeting.
